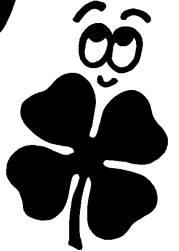

Instructions for your Helper

- 4) For each project youth can attach additional project activity sheets or workbooks that have been completes as evidence of project accomplishments.
- 5) Project pictures or drawings are illustrations of activities and accomplishments. Encourage youth show growth and development through their picture story.
